EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

IACLE's organization changed last year to a 3 region structure – Asia Pacific, Europe/Africa-Middle East and Americas. Each region is governed by a Regional Council, who works closely with the regional team of part- and full-time educational and operations staff as well as the Executive Board of IACLE to establish and execute strategies.

In working with IACLE's industry partners, we have established the following priority countries in each region, based on such factors as the contact lens educational needs and potential market.

These are the countries that will be targeted for such programs as the IACLE Institutions Program and where we will consider translation projects of resources such as the DLP, STEs and selected slides of the IACLE Contact Lens Course. To maximize outcomes, these are the countries where IACLE will focus time and resources, and will organize activities such as educational meetings and fellowships.

We have developed new resources in the form of interactive case reports that are nearing completion and will be made available to members in the second half of 2008.

We have developed and launched the IACLE Institutions Program – a program designed to establish collaborative working partnerships with IACLE members' institutions.

We have responded to our industry partners' request for highly trained individuals who can work with them at the local or regional level to develop and deliver practitioner education programs. The IACLE Train-the-Trainer program has been developed and piloted in China at 2 institutions. The program will be tailored accordingly and rolled out into other priority countries over the next several years.

Russia and Brazil are priority countries that have not been

easy for IACLE to penetrate. However, this past year we have made excellent progress in establishing contacts that will further our understanding of the regulations governing the various professions, the educational infrastructure and the contact lens markets in these countries.

We would like to thank our Latin American Regional Director Juan Carlos Aragon for providing insights into the Brazilian situation and his guidance in making considerable inroads. We would also like to thank the key representatives from CIBA Vision, Johnson & Johnson Vision Care and Bausch & Lomb for attending a meeting at the 2008 BCLA to discuss how to best work within Russia and for continuing to work with IACLE EAME President Judith Morris and IACLE Vice President Shehzad Naroo in making plans for our next steps. Through our interaction with local industry and professional associations in these countries, we look forward to establishing more informed strategies for working with the various professional groups in such a way that will conform to government regulations, as well as identifying institutions teaching contact lenses and those educators who will benefit from membership in IACLE


IACLE Membership

Currently IACLE Membership is comprised of contact lens educators from all eye care professions, including Optometrists, Ophthalmologists, Opticians, Contactologists and others, and is available at either Full, Associate or Industry levels.

Membership in IACLE continues to grow and today we reach more than 630 members from 328 academic institutions, associations, practices, companies, etc. in 64 countries worldwide.

From 1st July 2007 to 30th June 2008 IACLE membership grew by 71 - 41 new Full Members, 18 Associate Members and 12 Industry Members. Membership in priority countries increased by 39 Full, Associate and Industry Members.



Fellows of IACLE (FIACLEs)

Upon successful completion of the Accreditation Exam, IACLE members are eligible to apply for Fellow of IACLE (FIACLE) status.

With each administration of the Accreditation Examination, we will increase the number of FIACLEs – those members who have demonstrated that they have achieved a high level of contact lens knowledge. Our long term goal is to see the majority of members achieve this notable status, with emphasis in priority countries.

Following the latest administration of the Accreditation Examination in 2007, 75 successful candidates have applied for FIACLE status, including 12 from industry. This brings our current total of FIACLEs to 196, which represents 30% of the total IACLE membership. Of these FIACLEs, 83 or 42% are from priority countries.

Those members who have achieved FIACLE status are considered to be leaders in their field and while it is expected that all members will be ambassadors for IACLE and contact lens education, IACLE relies on these FIACLEs to assist in furthering the aims of IACLE at a higher level in their countries and regions. They are often called upon to mentor other colleagues and to develop and deliver high quality continuing education for practitioners. IACLE continues to support educators through various programs and has piloted a new Train-the-Trainer program this year, the aim of which is to improve the presentation skills of FIACLEs and selected members and train them to effectively conduct interactive lectures and workshops for delivery at educational meetings and practitioner continuing education sessions.

IACLE encourages our industry partners to develop relationships with their local FIACLEs for delivery of both generic and product related continuing education to the local practitioners. IACLE will act as a liaison in making these connections and recommending FIACLEs who have received advanced training in the delivery of continuing education.

Examples of where this has been highly successful include:

- Bausch & Lomb is using FIACLEs in different regions of India to deliver their Mastermind Program.
 FIACLEs include Rajeshwari Mahadevan, Ajay Shinde, Nagesh Vuppala, Dr Pravin Tellukala, Mr.
 Vinod, Ms. Monica Choudhary, Ms. Prema Chande, Mr. Jayantha Bhatacharya and Mr. Rajesh Wadhwa.
- The Vision Care Institute in Bangkok uses Indian FIACLEs to deliver lectures, including Nagesh Vuppala, Rajesh Wadhwa and Dr. Murali K Asuri.
- Ms. Monica Choudhry is a consultant for various contact lens companies including AMO and gets invited to attend and participate in many contact lens workshops.
- In Latin America, FIACLEs Jorge Ayala (Argentina), Ricardo Pintor (Mexico) and Orlando Neira (Colombia) have been invited to develop and present continuing education in their countries and regions by industry sponsors CIBA Vision and Johnson & Johnson Vision Care, Inc.

• Bausch & Lomb in Peru is developing a continuing education program to improve contact lens fitting and train practitioners in the management of complications. Rolando Rojas has been contracted to work with them to develop and deliver this program.


Key Country Representatives

Where a country is not represented by either a national/ regional coordinator or regional council member, we have identified and appointed key members to act as Country Representatives.

These key individuals are responsible for keeping us informed of contact lens educational news and activities in their countries and for reporting on opportunities for IACLE's involvement. They will also network with educators and industry representatives and help to identify those individuals who would benefit from IACLE membership.

Using knowledge of their national contact lens regulations and educational requirements, Country Representatives work closely with the Regional Councils to provide input into strategic plans for program and resource implementation at the local level.

An example of this assistance is felt in France, where Bernard Barthelemy helps IACLE to correspond with the members and drives programs such as the Student Trial Exam at several institutions. Each year, Bernard organizes a meeting with educators to discuss IACLE activities and resources.

2007 ACCREDITATION EXAMINATION

The Accreditation Examination was initially developed in association with the US National Board of Examiners in Optometry (NBEO) and was first conducted in 1996.

The exam consists of 150 multiple-choice test items, including visual recognition and case-based questions. The topics covered are:

- 1. Anatomy & physiology of the anterior eye
- 2. Design & management of contact lenses
- 3. Principles of contact lens fitting
- 4. Patient examination and delivery of contact lenses
- 5. Care and maintenance of contact lenses
- 6. Ocular responses to contact lenses
- 7. Complications resulting from contact lenses
- 8. Special contact lens topics

The sixth administration of the IACLE Accreditation Examination was held in October 2007 for 173 members in 35 countries, including 20 members from industry. This administration of the exam was available in English, Spanish, Simplified Chinese and Bahasa (Indonesian).

IACLE follows NBEO guidelines and uses the median as a "successful" outcome. This administration of the Exam resulted in 91 members meeting or exceeding the median and who are now considered to have achieved a satisfactory level of knowledge in contact lenses.

Each exam candidate received a detailed and confidential report of their results, including the raw scores for each of the sub-sections examined. The report indicates where a satisfactory level of knowledge is achieved and helps the candidate in identifying the areas where improvement is needed.

Successful completion of the Accreditation Examination qualifies members to apply for FIACLE status, showing that they have achieved a high level of contact lens knowledge. We will continue to work with this group of individuals to train them to skillfully develop and deliver high quality education for their students as well as for practitioners.



The DLP is also a proven program in that it is used to assist members in preparing to write the Accreditation Examination. Out of the 91 candidates who passed the 2007 Accreditation Examination, 62 (68%) were DLP participants.

DISTANCE LEARNING PROGRAM (DLP)

The IACLE Distance Learning Program (DLP) is an independent program that was designed to assist educators to improve their contact lens knowledge by systematically helping them to study each module of the IACLE Contact Lens Course (ICLC). After working through a certain section of the ICLC, participants are expected to complete assignments and submit these to the DLP coordinator for evaluation and feedback.

The DLP is available in English, Spanish, Simplified Chinese and Bahasa. There are 4 phases in the DLP and in each phase there are 5 assignments. DLP Phase 1 is based on Modules 1 to 3 of the ICLC, Phase 2 is based on sections of Module 3, as well as Modules 4 and 5, Phase 3 is based Modules 6 and 7 and Phase 4 is based on sections of Modules 8, 9 and 10.

There are currently 153 IACLE DLP participants broken down by region as follows:

The 153 current participants in the DLP are at varying stages of completion as follows:

- Phase 1 97 (63%)
- Phase 2 44 (29%)
- Phase 3 9 (6%)
- Phase 4 3 ongoing

Since July 2007, 23 members have completed all 4 phases of the DLP and were awarded the Certificate of Attainment.

The DLP is also a proven program in that it is used to assist members in preparing to write the Accreditation Examination. Out of the 91 candidates who passed the 2007 Accreditation Examination, 62 (68%) were DLP participants. However, it is important to note that finishing all assignments of the DLP is recommended prior to writing the exam as all 20 members who did complete the program were successful.

DEVELOPING NEW EDUCATIONAL RESOURCES

The focus of IACLE's educational materials development this past year has been the creation of a series of interactive Case Reports based on cases supplied by IACLE members. This project benefited enormously from the visit early in 2008 of Professor Janice Jurkus from Chicago's Illinois College of Optometry (ICO). Professor Jurkus sat with our Director of Educational Development (Dr Lewis Williams) over many hours creating some 10 Case Reports together. She is also IACLE's Assistant Secretary as well as an AOCLE member and visited Australia as part of her Faculty Development Leave from ICO.

An ongoing aspect of the Case Report project is the sourcing of further detailed real-world cases suitable for presentation. Cases used to date have been based largely on those supplied by Canadian and Indian members. Alternative sources that are under investigation include professional associations and academies, contact lens journals, and other educational institutions outside those already aligned with IACLE.

While the development and refinement of the content is the most significant aspect of the project, another important component is the form in which the series is to appear. Several formats and layouts have been trialed and as a result of feedback from the members who used the prototypes, a new Case Report format has been finalized.

This interactive resource will have a variety of end uses. These include use in tutorials and lectures (beginning or end depending on whether the educator wishes to prime the students to a topic or assess the absorption of information), or as a self-study aid for students.

Details regarding the packaging and delivery of the program are being finalized and will be announced in the near future.

DELIVERY OF EFFECTIVE TEACHING

IACLE Contact Lens Course (ICLC)

The ICLC is packaged to provide lectures (text, diagram and/or picture slides and related notes), practical sessions (discussion topics and exercises), and tutorials (quizzes and reading materials).

Now available only in CD-ROM format, educators and students have access to a PDF of the full-text module, as well as colour images and slides, which provide excellent visual representations that can be included in lectures and will enhance the learning experience. In 2007-2008 there were 85 full sets purchased by members and others worldwide. IACLE continues to provide each active Resource Center with a free full set of the IACLE Contact Lens Course.

Translation of the IACLE Contact Lens Course

A series of ongoing translation projects are underway currently to broaden the availability and use of the IACLE Contact Lens Course (ICLC) by providing either the whole or selected parts of the ICLC in several languages to cover a wider range of non-English speaking educators.

In the past, the main barrier to expending the significant resources and time demanded by a translation project has been the estimated size of the likely 'market' for the translation. The core languages that the ICLC were produced in (initially) were English, Spanish, Bahasa (Indonesian), and Chinese (Traditional & Simplified). Translations by regional IACLE members has resulted in a number of translations into other languages that, were it not for the generosity of members, would never have come about.

Languages in which translations of varying ambitions are underway (some early modules have already been delivered in some languages) include Korean, German, Italian, French and Portuguese. Further possibilities include Hungarian and Russian.

Multiple Choice Question Databank

For examination purposes (Accreditation and Student Trial Exams) IACLE maintains a large database of Multiple Choice exam Questions (MCQs). Given the difficulty of creating good quality, valid MCQs, an ongoing project is the expansion of the number of suitable MCQs held 'in stock'. Sources include members, especially our European members, industry sponsors, and other educators.

Teaching Educators How to Use IACLE Resources Effectively

IACLE has developed high quality and effective resources for the delivery of contact lens education. However, many educators still need guidance as to how to use these resources for effective teaching.

The need to incorporate practical and clinical experience for students into the curricula of institutions has been identified as a priority for IACLE. Even though many institutions do not currently have clinic facilities, practical components can be developed and implemented.

To further assist members in some regions, our regional coordinators and their staff visit affiliated institutions and introduce new resources, trial experimental resources (e.g. prototype Case Reports), review current resources, and seek opinions on what the educators would like to see developed. Delivery of effective teaching also means the streamlining of the delivery of resources. To this end, the IACLE Contact Lens Course is currently being repackaged from a 10 CD set to a single DVD to make it more cost effective and thus more affordable for students to purchase as a textbook.

The development of interactive Case Reports has been a priority for IACLE this past year and this valuable resource will add a practical component to the IACLE resource collection. It has been successfully trialed in India with students and educators. Further information about this program can be found in the Developing New Educational Resources section.

Streamlining of Resource Delivery

Delivery of effective teaching also means the streamlining of the delivery of resources. To this end, the IACLE Contact Lens Course is currently being repackaged from a 10 CD set to a single DVD to make it more cost effective and thus more affordable for students to purchase as a textbook. Further, with increased access and usage of the Internet by our members, we are investigating more interactive and web-based options for the delivery of these resources.

IACLE Resource Centers

IACLE Resource Centers are established and operated as a small library or reference center of contact lens-related educational resources, making resources such as the IACLE Contact Lens Course accessible, not only to IACLE members, but also to fellow educators and students.

EDUCATIONAL MEETINGS & FELLOWSHIPS

Ongoing support of educators is essential in ensuring that a high standard of contact lens knowledge is met, maintained and upgraded regularly. IACLE members are given the opportunity to improve their knowledge levels and teaching skills by participating in IACLE educational meetings, training programs and fellowships.

This past year IACLE has developed and piloted a new training program. The aim of the Train-the-Trainer program is to improve the presentation skills of FIACLEs and active IACLE members and train them to conduct interactive lectures and workshops for delivery at educational meetings and practitioner continuing education sessions. The first two Train-the-Trainer programs were held in Tianjin and Shanghai in May for 14 attendees from 11 institutions.

Educational meetings and workshops were conducted by the Americas Regional Council in priority countries Colombia and Mexico, as well as Argentina.

Judith Morris, the IACLE Regional President for Europe/ Africa-Middle East represented IACLE at several meetings throughout Europe, including Brno, Prague, France, Switzerland and Portugal.

Details of these meetings are highlighted in the regional sections of this report.

COLLABORATION WITH INSTITUTIONS

The goal of the IACLE Institutions Program is to encourage cooperation and collaborative efforts between educators, educational institutions and IACLE to improve the level of activities and educational/ clinical infrastructure at selected institutions. During their visits to the institutions, IACLE Coordinators meet with the heads of institutions and provide a full history of the support that IACLE has provided to their institution and their educators over the years. The Resource Centers will be assessed to determine which resources are available and how they are currently being utilized and clinical facilities will be evaluated to determine the extent of the practical component of their contact lens curriculum (ie number of patients examined and fit with contact lenses).

The Coordinators will meet with educators and current members of IACLE to discuss their contact lens curriculum and to learn how they are currently using the IACLE Contact Lens Course in the development of their lectures and practical workshops. This is also the opportunity for members to offer their feedback on IACLE programs and activities. Additionally, the Coordinators make time to meet with the students to give them information about IACLE and how they will be involved in the Institutions Program.

The institutions will be asked to show their support by:

- Encouraging educators to become IACLE members and to actively participate in all programs, including the Accreditation Exam and hence achieving FIACLE status
- Endorsing the use of the IACLE Contact Lens Course with educators to enhance the contact lens curriculum used at the institution
- Adopting the IACLE Contact Lens Course Modules as a student textbook
- Conducting Student Trial Exams for final year students (institutions to cover the expenses, OR in certain countries the local Industry to sponsor)
- Providing computers, slit lamps, clinical instrumentation and equipment for practical training
- Covering educator travel expenses to attend IACLE educational and international meetings



- Making data available to IACLE on their clinic activities and contact lens fitting, modalities, type of lenses, etc
- Providing space for IACLE Resource Centers so that all faculty members and students have access to resources
- In partnership with IACLE and our Industry Sponsors, hosting continuing education programs for practitioners

In some countries, an agreement has been drafted, presented to and adopted by the institutions, which outlines the commitment of both parties. The relationship between IACLE and the institution will be evaluated a year after program implementation and if it is determined that both parties are meeting their commitments, a 'Certificate of Affiliation' will be presented by IACLE to the head of the institution.

The Program has been initiated in China, India and Colombia this year and will continue to be rolled out throughout 2008 and 2009. To date, two institutions in China, six in India and four in Colombia have been visited. Further details of these visits are available in the regional section of this report.

INSTITUTIONAL DEMOGRAPHICS DATABASE

To gain knowledge about the level of contact lens activity in institutions and the market place, IACLE will be conducting a situational analysis in priority countries to develop the Institutional Demographics Database.

Ultimately, information collected will focus on the practical experience of students, including such things as:

- how many wear contact lenses
- how many patients or colleagues they have fitted with contact lenses

- which lenses and solutions are available in the clinic
- what wearing modality and care regimes are recommended
- which contact lens manufacturing companies they have regular contact with
- where their students practice after graduation (i.e. hospitals, academia, optical shops, industry, etc)
- which institutions have developed and delivered continuing education for practitioners

The initial survey conducted in 2007 gathered the following preliminary information:

- course and curriculum details
- clinical facilities availability
- patient load and number of fits required by students
- student information including refractive error, spectacle use and wearing of contact lenses

To date there have been 56 surveys completed and submitted by members – primarily from China, South Korea and India. A summary of information collected shows the following results:

- The Chinese schools that responded do not have clinics only contact lens laboratories. Therefore, there are far fewer patients fit prior to graduation than schools with clinics.
- Schools in China, South Korea and India all indicated that they have at least one computer with a CD/DVD player, a slit lamp, a keratometer and a retinoscope.
- The South Korean and the Indian schools all had SCL and RGP fitting sets, as well as contact lens solutions.
- Of the Chinese schools that responded, 60% had no SCL and RGP fitting sets or solutions.

This information is valuable in that it provides us with

a snap shot of the resources and clinical facilities that are available at the institutions. The results will assist IACLE at the local level to identify areas of need and work with the institution and, where appropriate, the local offices of our industry representatives to ensure that students are receiving adequate practical training prior to graduation.

STUDENT TRIAL EXAMS (STE)

The IACLE STE assists students in assessing their areas of expertise in contact lenses, as well as identifying any areas of lack of knowledge, thereby providing them with the confidence to go out into practice and successfully fit contact lenses. It is therefore recommended that the STE be scheduled just prior to their qualifying exams in their final year of study or at the end of their contact lens course.

The exam is set at a standard knowledge level suitable for final year students or newly qualifying graduates, and consists of 100 Multiple Choice Questions (MCQs). Thirty of these questions require the student to recognize/identify a certain type of lens fit or eye condition shown in a colour photograph.

IACLE believes that the stronger knowledge levels in students, will contribute to the reduction of contact lens-related complications, consequently leading to fewer patient dropouts. This will ultimately increase the popularity of, and consumer confidence in, contact lenses as a form of vision correction.





The 2007 exam is available in English, Simplified Chinese, Bahasa (Indonesian) and Korean. In this reporting period, there were 37 Exams held for 1256 students. IACLE believes that the stronger knowledge levels in students, will contribute to the reduction of contact lens-related complications, consequently leading to fewer patient dropouts. This will ultimately increase the popularity of, and consumer confidence in, contact lenses as a form of vision correction.

Since July of 2007, the IACLE STE has been conducted only when the direct costs of administering the exam are covered by either the institutions themselves, or through sponsorship from local and/or regional industry. Bausch & Lomb and Johnson & Johnson Vision Care, Inc. have generously supported the exam at selected schools in India and China.

PARTNERING WITH INDUSTRY

For the continued operation of IACLE and the ongoing development and implementation of educational activities, it is crucial that there is an understanding at all levels of industry of our mission, our current and future plans and accomplishments, our realized and potential impact on contact lens education and ultimately the long term effect this will have on the contact lens market. The future of IACLE is dependent on our industry partners committing to provide long-term support through in-kind and monetary contributions.

The key to securing this support is in having an open line of communication with our industry partners to communicate the educational requirements of contact lens educators and practitioners at the local and regional levels and how IACLE has been addressing these needs. IACLE has developed a reporting mechanism that will be used to inform our industry sponsors, whether they are at the local, regional or global level, about our current activities and accomplishments, as well as our strategic path for the future.

IACLE works closely with a group of key individuals from each of our industry partners, who form a global advisory board. These are the individuals that we rely on to provide guidance and feedback in setting the Association's strategic initiatives, goals and plans on the global level. This arrangement has proven very successful and the same principle is applied at the regional level as well.

At the BCLA meeting in Birmingham, members of industry from the Europe region met to discuss the situation in Russia as this is one of our global priority countries. The potential for growth in Russia is significant, but there is a lack of information available regarding governmental regulations, institutions teaching contact lenses and those educators who would benefit from membership in IACLE. This regional advisory group discussed the best approach moving forward. As a result of this discussion, we have identified the need to have a representative in Russia who can help us to make these initial connections and eventually help us to find an educational person who will be able to work with IACLE on a more formal basis to advance contact lens educational activities.

As an in-kind way of supporting IACLE at the local level, several representatives from our industry partners have volunteered their time to become Industry Coordinators. The individuals help to identify institutions and potential educators for membership in IACLE. They have intimate knowledge of the local language and regulatory issues that will influence how IACLE operates in a particular country. To date we have been fortunate to have representatives from industry in South Korea, Taiwan and China volunteer their time by working closely with IACLE.

Programs and resources that have been developed specifically in collaboration with our industry partners are the IACLE Technical Training Program and Practitioner Continuing Education Programs.

IACLE Technical Training Program

The IACLE Technical Training Program is designed for the training and development of industry sales and technical personnel, as well as the optometric or ophthalmic assistants, receptionists or other front line staff in any clinical contact lens practice by providing learners with basic technical knowledge and contact lens terminology.

This educational program is comprised of video segments, narration and graphic screens, and is presented in six chapters (in CD ROM format), each approximately 45 minutes in length:

- 1. The Eye
- 2. Introduction to Soft Contact Lenses
- 3. Soft Contact Lens Fitting
- 4. Toric Lenses
- 5. Complications in Contact Lens Wear
- 6. Soft Contact Lenses for Presbyopia

The initial development of this program was partially funded through a special educational grant from Ocular Sciences Inc. (OSI), and through additional support, the six-unit set was translated into Korean and compiled for use in South Korea. However, the intellectual property and distribution rights of this program belong exclusively to IACLE, and hence it is available for purchase by all IACLE Industry sponsors in its current form, as a generic program or customized to include their own branding.

It is also notable that the current program can be expanded to include additional topics, such as 'Contact Lens Care and Maintenance' and 'Silicone Hydrogel Lenses for Continuous Wear'. IACLE is also able to design other interactive teaching tools in this format for any of our industry sponsors, tailored to suit a particular company and its products, or targeted for specific countries (translations possible) and a particular audience. Such self-paced, independent learning tools can significantly reduce the time, effort and costs involved in providing corporate training.

Practitioner Continuing Education

While IACLE recognizes the demand for practitioner education as a means of updating practicing contact lens fitters on the latest research findings and product information, practitioners are not IACLE's key stakeholders and as such we have developed and presented these programs only when fully funded through special educational grants.

There are a variety of ways that IACLE can be involved in practitioner education:

At the most fundamental level, IACLE can recommend FIACLEs who are knowledgeable and skilled at delivering contact lens education to our industry partners. The industry partner then works directly with the FIACLE for the development and delivery of the program and IACLE's role is only to facilitate the relationship.

Another way for IACLE to be involved in practitioner education is to develop the materials that will be delivered by the FIACLEs. Even though the industry partner is responsible for the organization of the event itself, this does of course demand a higher level of involvement from IACLE and often includes a member of the IACLE team in the delivery.



IACLE can also organize and manage a moderate scale practitioner education program for the industry partner. The materials are developed by IACLE and delivered by local IACLE staff and FIACLEs. IACLE's involvement in this level of program extends beyond just development to the full organization of the event.

On a much larger scale, IACLE can organize a program that will be developed and delivered by global and regional IACLE staff and executive board members.

The level of involvement of the IACLE team will determine the level of support required and we encourage our industry partners to discuss these options in detail when considering a partnership to develop and deliver the highest quality contact lens education to practitioners.

IACLE has been involved in several Continuing Education Programs this past year in a variety of ways, ranging from development of materials and recommendation of FIACLEs for delivery, to review of materials developed by others and liaison with speakers and institutions to organize delivery of the programs. IACLE industry sponsors who are interested in conducting Continuing Education Programs should contact the appropriate Regional Coordinator or any member of the Executive Board for further information and to obtain a copy of the recently updated IACLE Guidelines for Practitioner Continuing Education.



Industry Seminars and Workshops

Industry Seminars and Workshops are an opportunity for industry to present students with products and promotional material and to discuss market trends. They provide graduating practitioners with information that positively contributes to their knowledge and skills in comfortably and confidently fitting contact lenses and managing their patients. Although Industry Seminars are no longer officially organized by IACLE, many institutions and local industry partner representatives continue to hold them as they value the exchange of information and the relationships that are built between the schools, educators, students and industry representatives.

Following this administration of the examination, 52 members from Asia Pacific have applied for and were approved for FIACLE status (6 successful participants were already FIACLEs). These FIACLEs have achieved a high level of contact lens knowledge and can be called upon to develop and deliver continuing education to practitioners. Of the 14 new FIACLEs in China, 4 participated in the Train-the-Trainer programs held in China this year.

DISTANCE LEARNING PROGRAM (DLP)

The DLP in Multiple Choice Question (MCQ) format is currently available in English, Chinese and Bahasa (Indonesian) for our Asia Pacific members. This program was used extensively as preparation for the 2007 Accreditation Examination and will continue to be used as members upgrade their knowledge levels and prepare to write the next administration of the exam.

There are currently 160 DLP participants worldwide, 113 from the Asia Pacific Region.

Throughout the year, 19 members in Asia Pacific completed all 4 phases of the DLP. Those that have completed the program but were not successful in the 2007 Accreditation Examination (or did not participate), will be encouraged to continue to prepare to write the next administration of the exam.

Participants were surveyed for feedback on the DLP, including the overall benefits as well as the format and scope of the questions. Of those surveyed, 38 responded – 17 from priority countries. A summary of the results from the priority countries is as follows:

One comment that was shared by more than half of the participants is that they want more practical and visual recognition questions included in the DLP. The purpose of the survey has been to gather feedback on the program and to determine where future changes are warranted. This will be taken into consideration as we set and prioritize our plans for the upcoming years.

DELIVERY OF EFFECTIVE TEACHING

Translation of Resources

It is important that educators and students have access to high quality resources in their native language. Unfortunately, we have found that these are not always available. Therefore, we have been steadily working over the years to translate the IACLE Contact Lens Course into languages such as Simplified and Traditional Chinese, as well as Bahasa (Indonesian). All modules are now complete and available in Simplified and Traditional Chinese. Module 8 in Bahasa will be completed in early 2009.

Selected slides of the ICLC have also been translated into Korean by FIACLEs Professor Kichoong Mah, Professor Jai Min Kim and Professor Koonja Lee. These slides will be made available to Resource Centers and students in the near future.

Trialing of Case Reports

India Coordinator Karthikeyan Baskaran trialed the new Case Reports project at two schools during his visits to launch the Institutions Program. The presentation was conducted as a quiz in order to have the session more interactive. The feedback from the IACLE members present was that they felt the cases were presented at an appropriate level for use with the students.

EDUCATIONAL MEETINGS AND FELLOWSHIPS

Train-the-Trainer Program – Shanghai and Beijing, China

The aim of IACLE's Train-the-Trainer program is to improve the presentation skills of FIACLEs and active IACLE members and train them to conduct interactive lectures and workshops for delivery at educational meetings and practitioner continuing education sessions. The program was piloted in China with two programs during the first half of 2008. Two additional programs are planned for the remainder of the year.

The program is designed to most effectively work with a smaller number of registrants, as they will receive a more intensive training experience. To select participants, the National China Coordinators visited potential institutions and identified active members and FIACLE's for this level of training.

The first 2 Train-the-Trainer programs were held in Tianjin and Shanghai in May for 14 attendees from 11 institutions.

The program included lectures and workshops on such broad topics as:

- Slit lamp biomicroscopy
- Soft spherical and toric contact lenses
- Care and maintenance

However, the emphasis of the program was on how to deliver these topics and therefore the training focused on:

- 1. How to effectively use IACLE resources to develop lecture materials
- 2. Skills for delivering lecture materials
- 3. How to conduct hands-on workshops

IACLE staff served as facilitators during the discussions and workshops for the open exchange of ideas.

Each attendee was given a topic at the end of the first day and was required to prepare and give a presentation on the following day. The presentation materials and delivery were assessed by their colleagues and an open discussion held at the end of each presentation.

The skills gained through this program will enable educators to enhance the learning experience for their students. They are also encouraged to work with our industry partners or their local associations to conduct practitioner education on these topics.

Following two similar programs later in 2008, IACLE will follow up with all attendees and several will be selected to participate in advanced level training in 2009.

Three of the attendees Lin, Li Yanhong and Wang Ling have since been involved in working with Johnson & Johnson Vision Care, Inc. to deliver continuing education to practitioners.

Korean Optical Association (KOA) Meeting

IACLE President Debbie Sweeney and AP Regional Coordinator Lakshmi Shinde travelled to South Korea to attend the annual KOA meeting. In addition to attending the meeting, they took this opportunity to have in-depth discussions with representatives of IACLE's industry partners, members of the KOA and our Korean FIACLEs. During these discussions, each FIACLE took responsibility for an activity in South Korea, including growth of membership, Student Trial Exams, Resource Centers, FIACLE activities and translation of selected slides of the IACLE Contact Lens Course. This level of involvement from these FIACLEs has resulted in a list of all potential institutions within South Korea with potential for IACLE membership and Resource Centers, Module 3, 4 & 5 slides have been translated into Korean, institutions are registering and paying for the STE and there has been an increase in membership.

IACLE is in discussion with representatives of the KOA to explore opportunities of working together to develop continuing education programs for their association members.

COLLABORATION WITH INSTITUTIONS

IACLE Institutions Program

The goal of the IACLE Institutions Program is to encourage cooperation and collaborative efforts between educators, educational institutions and IACLE to improve the level of activities and educational/ clinical infrastructure at selected institutions. More can be read about this initiative in the global section of this report.

China

In China, 11 institutions were selected as priority institutions for this program and 7 institutions have been contacted thus far to provide information about IACLE's involvement in China and particularly the support they have provided to the institutions and the educators. The heads of the institutions now understand IACLE's commitment to contact lens education and they have agreed to support this program and their educators' participation in IACLE programs.

The Tianjin Professional University houses the IACLE China (Tianjin) office and is quite knowledgeable about IACLE activities and assistance. They have agreed to support their educators by helping to meet the costs of their membership fees and to encourage the use of the IACLE Contact Lens Course CDs as a student textbook. We have already received orders for these CDs.

At the Tianjin Medical University, National Coordinator Wang Haiying met with Professor Li (Head of Optometry School) and Professor Yao Jin (Vice-Head of Optometry School). Wang Haiying took this opportunity to provide the school with a complete set of IACLE Resources, including all those available in Simplified Chinese. She gave a presentation about IACLE and spent time discussing such issues as how the school could support the educators and programs like the Student Trial Exams for final year students. The Heads of School were pleased to receive the resources as they find them to be very useful and helpful for the students. They are also ordering the IACLE Contact Lens Course CDs for the students and have agreed to help meet the cost of IACLE membership for their educators.

From IACLE, these institutions are looking for assistance in curriculum development, training for educators and additional resources. For example, the National Coordinators will work with the educators to carefully review the STE results in 2008 and determine where changes in the curriculum can be made so as to increase the scores on future administrations.

India

In India, ten institutes were selected as priority institutes for this program. Since May 2008, India National Coordinator Karthikeyan Baskaran has visited the following schools:

Karthikeyan met with the head of each institution and the resource coordinator and discussed this collaborative program. Main topics of discussion included:

- 1. IACLE's contribution to contact lens education in India, the institute and the contact lens educators.
- 2. IACLE programs such as the Student Trial Exam (STE).
- 3. The proposal for the institute to subsidize membership fees and allow time away from teaching commitments for IACLE members who are responsible for establishing resource centers in the institute.

It was also discussed with the head of the institute that IACLE will issue a Certificate of Affiliation to the institutes if they satisfy the criteria that has been specified by IACLE. In turn, the institutes can aim for acceptance by international associations and organizations.

All institutions made a commitment to IACLE and confirmed their participation in the Institutions Program.

Representatives of IACLE's industry partners at the local level were invited to visit the schools with Karthikeyan, but to date none have participated. This is an excellent opportunity for industry to make contact with the administration and educators at these schools and to develop relationships with the students who will be next year's practitioners.

STUDENT TRIAL EXAMS

Student Trial Exams remain a priority throughout the Asia Pacific region and institutions and local industry have responded favourably by meeting the direct costs associated with administering the exams. Bausch & Lomb and Johnson & Johnson Vision Care have generously supported this program in China and India. The 2007 exam paper is available in English, Simplified Chinese, Bahasa and Korean. The 2008 paper is available in English and Simplified Chinese with further translation under consideration.

Throughout this reporting period, 28 Student Trial Exams were held for more than 1200 students.

We will also be considering Eastern European languages as well.

Resource availability and distribution is the first half of the formula for effective teaching skills. The second is ensuring educators are knowledgeable in how to use the resources to develop their curriculum and deliver their courses.

All educational and informal meetings with members in the region have a special emphasis on how IACLE resources can be used to develop or tailor contact lens curricula.

Over the past year, 15 complete sets of the IACLE Contact Lens Course CDs were distributed to Resource Centers and educators.

EDUCATIONAL MEETINGS

Judith Morris attended a number of meetings throughout the year on behalf of IACLE.



European Contact Lens Forum (ECLF) Meeting Geneva, Switzerland 18th August 2007

Judith Morris attended this meeting on behalf of IACLE, a member of the ECLF. In addition to the regulatory issues discussed, the meeting confirmed the forum's 360° educational focus including:

- introductory education
- continuous education
- train the trainer
- recommended books
- basic equipment
- refresher courses
- module on regulation

The ECLF members agreed that they should not take on the responsibility of organizing training, but can make

known the tools that are available (the IACLE Contact Lens Course, IACLE Distance Learning Program). They will encourage educators to increase their knowledge levels by supporting the organization of "Train-the-Trainer" courses to build confidence in the Eastern European countries. It was suggested that there could be an annual IACLE event.

One of the largest programs being coordinated by the ECLF (European Contact Lens Forum consisting of Euromcontact, EFCLIN, ECOO, ECLSO and IACLE) is the CLEER (Contact Lens European Evidence Reporting) Project - a one-year web-based project to provide factual data i.e. evidence about significant incidents in Europe with contact lenses. These data will be used to factually support discussions with European and national authorities to regulate the supply of contact lenses in order to ensure the protection of the public.

European Council of Optometry and Optics (ECOO) Meeting

Lisbon, Portugal

12th - 14th October 2007

Judith Morris attended this meeting on behalf of IACLE. The purpose of the meeting was the presentation of the European Academy, a working group of which IACLE is a member of the Executive Committee.

European Contact Lens Forum (ECLF) Meeting Malta

5th January 2008

Judith Morris represented IACLE at this meeting. In follow-up to the meeting in Geneva, the main topics of discussion at this meeting were the issues related to education, uncontrolled distribution, and plano cosmetic lenses, and how to obtain European legislation in these areas.

The status of the CLEER Project was discussed and IACLE's contribution is to draft the questionnaire and provide translation into Spanish, as well as analysis of the data collected.

IACLE Meeting (France)

Association des Optométristes de France (AOF) Annual Meeting

Paris, France

28th January 2008

In addition to Judith Morris (Regional President) and Bernard Barthelemy (Country Representative – France), the meeting was attended by members, potential members, and representatives of members from 6 institutions in France and Belgium, plus one member from industry.

The meeting was an opportunity to discuss IACLE activities and programs in the region and in particular in France and Belgium. The following are outcomes of these discussions:

Resources

There is confusion about what resources should be available in the Resource Centers. A survey will be sent to all existing Resource Center Coordinators and we will work to ensure that missing resources will be provided (where possible). Bernard Barthelemy will follow up with those institutions that do not have Resource Centers and will identify the appropriate member to take on this responsibility. Once that is complete, IACLE will arrange to have the resource center kit distributed.

FIACLE Status

It is not clear that successful completion of the Accreditation Examination does not automatically mean that members become FIACLEs. It was explained that they must apply for their FIACLE status. As a result, we will look at previous administrations of the exam to identify those members who successfully completed the exam but have not yet applied and follow up with them accordingly.

Student Trial Exams

The Student Trial Exam was held at several institutions in France in 2007 and will be again in 2008. The exam has been well received but they would like a certificate for their students – the template has been provided to the institutions.



Membership

They would like to establish a network of French speaking members in France, Belgium and Switzerland so a list has been circulated.

Educator Meeting

It was agreed that another formal educational meeting be organized for members from all French speaking countries (including Algeria, Tunisia and Morocco), such as was done several years ago. While it had originally been decided that this should be done in conjunction with SILMO in October 2008, it was later moved to the AOF in early 2009. Several IACLE members and industry representatives have offered to help Bernard Barthelemy in the organization of this meeting.

Translation

We are continuing to push for translation of the selected slides of the IACLE Contact Lens Course into French. However, the idea of using a student to help in the translation was not well received and it was agreed that it would be better to have a member who has retired from their academic career to do this work.

Meeting On European Optometric Education

Brno, Czech Republic

23rd to 24th February 2008

Sebastian Marx, FIACLE from Jena, Germany, presented at the Education Congress on 22nd Feb on behalf of IACLE. The topic of his presentation was Contact Lens Practice. Judith Morris attended the meeting on behalf of IACLE and had the opportunity to meet with educators and members from Romania, Poland, Serbia, Belgium and Hungary. Some of the issues discussed included:

- Sebastian Marx will work with Peter Moest to organize an educational meeting in Germany in conjunction with the VDC in 2009
- Sebastian Marx and his team will continue the translation of selected slides of the IACLE Contact Lens Course into German
- Educators from Romania, Serbia and Belgium are interested in IACLE membership
- There is a new school in Hungary and we will follow up to identify potential members and hopefully establish a Resource Center
- There is a new Contact Lens Association established in Poland – once fully established, educators should become members of IACLE

Judith also met with Vadim Davydov from St. Petersburg, Russia. He provided details of contact lens education in Russia and provided information about annual meetings held for the two professional groups - opticians and ophthalmologists. He offered to publish an article about IACLE in his journal - Actual Optometry.

COLLABORATION WITH INSTITUTIONS AND ASSOCIATIONS

IACLE Institutions Program

Judith Morris has always looked for ways of helping educators – particularly those in the Eastern European countries where often few contact lens educational resources are available and where formal teaching institutions do not always exist. Therefore, the IACLE Institutions Program may need to be tailored accordingly throughout Europe, with emphasis on working with the educators and, where possible, the institutions in priority countries to develop collaborative partnerships.

European Council of Optometry and Optics (ECOO)

Judith has been working closely with ECOO, whose purpose is the development of Optometry in Europe – through education and focusing on patient protection. As an organization, they are attempting to standardize education and regulations across Europe. The outcomes of ECOO's work will impact institutions throughout Europe.

European Contact Lens Forum (ECLF)

The ECLF consists of representatives from Euromcontact, European Federation of the Contact Lens Industry (EFCLIN), European Council of Optometry and Optics (ECOO), European Contact Lens Society of Ophthalmologists (ECLSO) and IACLE. The establishment of this forum will give a cohesive voice to promote issues affecting the growth of contact lenses in areas such as regulatory affairs, collection of data and education.

The exams are now held only where full-cost recovery of direct costs is met. These costs are assessed on a per student basis (plus shipping costs) and are on a sliding scale according to the purchasing power parity (PPP) of the country.

We encourage our Industry partners to closely interact with educators in their regions and work with them to become members of IACLE. Bausch & Lomb has taken this to the next level by committing to sponsor the membership for many educators throughout the region where there is financial need. IACLE will be working closely with our industry partners in Russia to gather this information and establish which institutions and educators should be contacted. The long term goal is to have someone working with IACLE at the local level to grow membership, communicate with the educators about IACLE activities and resources, and to eventually implement and drive educational programs.

IACLE in Russia

At the 2008 BCLA meeting in Birmingham, members of industry representatives from CIBA Vision, Johnson & Johnson Vision Care and Bausch & Lomb met with IACLE Executive and staff to discuss the situation in Russia as this is one of our global priority countries.

The potential for growth in Russia is significant, but there is a lack of information available regarding governmental regulations, institutions teaching contact lenses and those educators who would benefit from membership in IACLE. This regional industry advisory group discussed the best approach moving forward in gathering information about governmental regulations, institutions teaching contact lenses and educators who would be qualified for membership in IACLE.

AMERICAS REGIONAL REPORT

The Americas regional team is comprised of a part-time Regional Coordinator and Regional Administrator (totaling 1.0 full time equivalent (FTE)) and works primarily in Latin America. Juan Carlos Aragon acted in a voluntary capacity as the Regional Director for Latin America. The regional team works very closely with the Regional Council and together they are responsible for setting strategies for Latin America and driving IACLE programs.

Of the 13 DLP participants that participated in the Accreditation Examination, the six that were successful had completed more than half of all assignments.

The goal is to have 100% members (who have not achieved FIACLE status) at priority institutions participating in this program. Currently priority institutions FUAA and Santo Tomas University have enrolment of **100%** and **60%** respectively. As well, of the 70 members in Latin America, only 20 have achieved FIACLE status. The remaining members are strongly encouraged to participate in the DLP and to prepare to write the next administration of the Accreditation Examination.

DELIVERY OF EFFECTIVE TEACHING

Translation of the IACLE Contact Lens Course (ICLC)

A priority for IACLE over the years has been the translation of the entire IACLE Contact Lens Course into Spanish. This project is nearing completion as Module 8 – the last in the series – has now been translated and is in the final proofreading stage.

In addition to the Spanish translation, two IACLE members from Brazil have volunteered their time to translate selected slides from the ICLC into Portuguese. The availability of these slides will certainly open doors for IACLE with the Brazilian educators.

Through the IACLE Institutions Program, we anticipate an increase in this number as it becomes a required textbook for students studying contact lenses.

EDUCATIONAL MEETINGS

Three educational meetings and workshops were held in Latin America since July 2007: Colombia, Mexico and Argentina.

Colombia

The first meeting was held in Colombia on 26th September 2007 at the Universidad de La Salle in Bogota for 24 educators from 7 institutions (including the Deans of each institution) plus one industry representative from CIBA Vision. With both the Deans of the institutions and the educators in attendance, the objectives of the meeting were to:

- Make the initial presentation of the Institutions Program to the Deans to gauge their interest
- Get commitment from and encourage the Deans to continue supporting IACLE and its activities
- Increase IACLE activity at the Colombian Schools
- Renew the relationship and commitment between IACLE and their members
- Improve the educators' writing skills to encourage them to submit more publications to journals

Jairo Garcia, Dean of the School of Optometry at La Salle University, opened the meeting. His comments included: "We need to learn to visualize the future. We need to get more quality educators, must achieve not only the aim of giving knowledge but to transform minds and always be to the forefront. Now, IACLE is giving us a maximum opportunity. We are here all Colombian's deans, having a great responsibility and the opportunity of compare, propose and collaborate together in important projects. Enjoy this moment".

The program included a variety of topics including:

Following these presentations and the ensuing discussions, the following conclusions, goals and plans were established:

- The IACLE Contact Lens Course has not been used by all institutions, but there is a renewed enthusiasm and the institutions are looking forward to using the ICLC and IACLE resources. Guillermo Carrillo and Sergio Garcia will work with the schools to implement the IACLE Contact Lens Course to standardize their curricula.
- 2. IACLE needs better communication with the members and follow up of their activities related to IACLE programs. Educators will complete surveys about their Resource Centers and provide feedback about how resources are being utilized. FIACLEs will need to report on their activities on a monthly or quarterly basis. IACLE will keep members informed of new resources and programs and will work with the educators to show them how to effectively use IACLE Resources.

- 3. In the past, there has not been active participation in the Student Trial Exam by Colombian schools. As part of the new IACLE Institutions Program, this will become a requirement of their commitment and the institutions will meet the administration costs. IACLE will show the educators how they should use the results to assess and tailor their programs as required to show improved results in future administrations. Sergio Garcia will be responsible for follow up with the institutions.
- 4. The schools in Bogotá receive support from the local companies. However, the institutions outside the capital city are still having some troubles in getting industry participation and supplies. While, CooperVision has donated spherical and toric lenses to the school in Andina this is not being done by all IACLE industry partners. Therefore, it is necessary to re-establish relationships between local industry and the institutions. Guillermo Carrillo and Fernando Ballesteros will facilitate this communication and encourage them to make contact with the schools. The educators can then invite them to organize Industry Seminars and Workshops.
- 5. We need an updated database of all available institutions and educators so that we are aware of potential areas of growth. By holding this meeting and identifying educators, there has been an increase of 5 members in Colombia.
- 6. The members want an exchange of information between educators and institutions. They are planning visits to other institutions as invited speakers for the students.

Mexico

A second meeting was held from 17th to 19th October 2007 at the Universidad Nacional Autónoma de Mexico for 14 educators from 4 institutions plus 3 representatives of industry (Bausch & Lomb, CIBA Vision and Johnson & Johnson Vision Care, Inc.). Past Vice President of IACLE, Desmond Fonn participated in this meeting.

As the Deans of three of the institutions were in attendance in addition to the educators, the objectives of the meeting were as follows:

- Make the initial presentation of the Institutions Program to the Deans to gauge their interest
- Get commitment and encourage Deans to continue supporting IACLE and its activities
- Increase IACLE activity at the Mexican Schools
- Renew the commitment between IACLE and their members

The meeting opened with welcoming addresses by both Ruben Velazquez and Martha Uribe who thanked IACLE for all these years of support and renewed her commitment to continue supporting the development of her educators.

The Program included the following topics:

- Evolution of Silicone Hydrogel Materials, Ricardo Pintor
- Clinical Management of Contact Lens Wearers, Desmond Fonn

Following these presentations and the ensuing discussions, the following conclusions, goals and plans were established:

- 1 While Johnson & Johnson Vision Care and Bausch & Lomb have been actively involved with the institutions, this is not the case with the other industry representatives. Bausch & Lomb has donated nearly 30,000 soft spherical and toric contact lenses to the schools in Mexico but it was agreed that the use of the donated lenses will be monitored. Guillermo Carrillo will follow up with the other industry representatives to get them more involved in academic institutions and establish connections with the educators.
- 2 Only UNAM and UAC are following the IACLE Contact Lens Course in their curriculum, are using IACLE Resources and are participating in IACLE programs. Guillermo Carrillo and Ruben Valasequez will be following up with the other institutions to ensure the Resource Centers have a coordinator and are fully stocked. They will work with the educators to review their curricula and show them how to use the ICLC and IACLE Resources in developing and delivering their courses.
- 3 The Deans of the institutions all agreed to meet with Guillermo Carrillo to discuss the IACLE Institutions Program. These visits will be conducted in the second half of 2008. Once the program has been launched at these institutions and we are confident that the educators are participating in IACLE programs and using IACLE Resources, Student Trial Exams will be scheduled to measure the impact made be evaluating student knowledge.

Argentina

On 13th – 14th June 2008, a meeting was held in Buenos Aires, Argentina for 22 educators from 13 institutions and associations plus 8 industry representatives from Bausch & Lomb, CooperVision, Johnson & Johnson Vision Care, Inc. and local contact lens companies.

The program ran over two days in different locations and with different agendas and objectives. The first meeting was addressed to local IACLE members with a program with primarily didactic lectures delivered by the Americas Regional Council and FIACLE Jorge Ayala. The second meeting was an opportunity to meet all people related to the contact lens market, i.e educators from all schools, people from local industry, head of schools and people interested in developing contact lens education.

Conclusions

Despite the political problems between the levels of education and the issue of recognizing optometry as a profession, the contact lens market in Argentina shows great potential and an expectation for growth in the area of education. Thus, we need a greater commitment between institutions, industry and IACLE. IACLE through its regional office will coordinate enrollment of new IACLE members and the approach to contact lens industry to develop a concrete plan to reactive IACLE in Argentina.



COLLABORATION WITH INSTITUTIONS

The goal of the IACLE Institutions Program is to encourage cooperation and collaborative efforts between educators, educational institutions and IACLE to improve the level of activities and educational/ clinical infrastructure at selected institutions. More can be read about this initiative in the global section of this report.

In the Americas region, seven institutions were selected as priority institutions for this program – four in Colombia and three in Mexico. To date, the four institutions in Colombia have been visited and the Mexican schools will be visited later in 2008.

- confirmed that they have established Resource Centers that are adequately stocked and available to students

The Members:

- are interested in the DLP as they feel this program will benefit them by not only updating their knowledge but also providing acknowledgement of a certain number of hours or academic credits of upgrading within their institutions and on their CVs
- would like more information about the possibility of being part of a research project or sharing the effort with other IACLE institutions (experience exchange)
- are interested in having access through their member ID to links and to a discussion forum – this has since been established for all Latin American members
- suggested the possibility of some kind of support to access post-graduate studies through IACLE or to establish a network with the support of regional companies

The Students:

- gained knowledge of IACLE and contact lens education
- understand the benefits in and are motivated about using, recommending and fitting contact lenses
- were informed about STE and it was explained to them the reason for measuring their level of knowledge through this program (STE)
- are very interested in being involved in this program and have a competitive spirit

Guillermo Carrillo and Regional Council officers Sergio Garcia and Fernando Ballesteros will continue to work with the educators in developing their curricula, teaching them how to use the ICLC and IACLE Resources, and getting them enrolled and participating in IACLE programs. They will continue their communication with the heads of the institutions to keep them enthusiastic and involved in the IACLE Institutions Program.

The program will be rolled out in Mexico at 3 priority institutions during the second half of 2008.

PARTNERING WITH INDUSTRY

Interaction with IACLE's industry partners in Latin America has increased through distribution of the quarterly IACLE Bulletin, which is sent to more than 100 representatives of IACLE industry partners, local contact lens companies and distributors.

The Regional Coordinator and Regional Council officers will maintain more consistent communication with the local and regional industry representatives through telephone calls and email correspondence. Whenever invited to attend educational meetings in the region they will meet with industry to discuss market trends, IACLE and FIACLE activities, assess educational needs and set plans and priorities.



Industry Participation

Several members from industry have shown interest in becoming members of IACLE and since 2007 we have seen an increase in Industry Membership to 6 for Latin America. Overall for the Americas region, there are 12 industry members, 2 FIACLEs and 3 participating in the DLP

FIACLE Profile – **KICHOONG MAH** – Asia Pacific Region

Professor Kichoong Mah first graduated with a degree in mining engineering 1984 from Joenbuk National University and then went on to graduate in 1985 from the Korean Optical School. In 1988 he received his Masters of Education from the Graduate School of Danguk University and in 2000 was awarded his PhD in physics from the Graduate School of Sungkyunkwan University.

In 1986 and 1987, Professor Mah was a lecturer in the Department of Optics at both the Taejeon Health College and Dongnam Health College. In 1989 he became a lecturer at the Seoul Health College and from 1992 – 1996 held the position of Head of the Department of Ophthalmic Optics. During this time, he was promoted to Assistant Professor and in 1999 he became an Associate Professor. In 2004, he joined the Department of Optometry, Graduate School of Health Science at the Eulji University as an Associate Professor. Currently, his major areas of teaching include physiological optics, contact lenses and binocular vision.

In addition to his academic and research responsibilities, Professor Mah has held past positions on the Korean Association of Ophthalmic Optics Educators, the Korean Optometric Association and the Korean Society of Vision Science. In 2002 he was awarded a Research Fellowship by the Cornea and Contact Lens Research Unit (CCLRU) at the University of New South Wales in Australia. In May 2007 he was awarded the Topcon Korea Academic Research Award by the Korean Society of Vision Science/Korean Optometric Association and in August 2008 was the first place winner of the poster competition at the 2nd Asean Optometry Conference in Malaysia. Currently he is the Vice President of the Korean Society of Vision Science. Professor Mah became a member of IACLE in 1992 as he wanted to gain knowledge and clinical skills of contact lens practice and become a good contact lens educator for teaching students and practitioners in Korea.

Professor Mah first wrote the Accreditation Examination in 2000 at which time he qualified for FIACLE status. Over the years he has participated in IACLE meetings and is currently enrolled in the Distance Learning Program. Most recently, he has translated selected slides of the IACLE Contact Lens Course into Korean.

As a way of promoting contact lens education and awareness in South Korea, Professor Mah has lectured at the Vision Care Institute at the Seoul Health College, the CIBA Vision Academy at Eulji University, has provided continuing education through the Korean Optometric Association, has published over 90 papers in scientific journals and presented more than 130 papers and posters at scientific conferences around the world. He has also authored and translated 12 textbooks about optometry.

When asked for his thoughts about IACLE, he responded:

IACLE is the best organization of contact lens education worldwide. The contact lens modules provide standardized high quality material for contact lens education in Korea. I have had a good chance to upgrade my knowledge and education skills [with] IACLE resources. FIACLE Profile – **WIM BORST** – Europe/Africa-Middle East Region

Wim Borst began his career in 1981 as an Optician and went to work for, and eventually manage, several optical shops. During this time, he took optometry and contact lens courses and became the chain's first contact lens practitioner.

In 1997 Wim went back to school in Utrecht and graduated with a Bachelor of Optometry degree in 1999. At that time he joined the optical department of Deltion College at Zwolle, where he continues to educate opticians and contact lens practitioners. He also cooperates with manufacturers in research on contact lens materials and RGP lens designs.

In 2004 Wim became a member of IACLE after attending a meeting in the Netherlands organized by IACLE member Eef van der Worp where he introduced IACLE to the Dutch contact lens educators. Since that time Wim has been actively involved in IACLE programs. He is the Resource Center Coordinator and regularly submits multiple choice questions (MCQs) to the IACLE exam question database. He has participated in several IACLE meetings at the BCLA and has helped to organize meetings in the Netherlands and Belgium.

Wim is an officer of the Europe/Africa-Middle East Regional Council for several years and acts as an ambassador for IACLE by informally meeting with contact lens educators and members of industry whenever possible at national and international meetings. In 2006, Wim was invited to attend the IACLE Asia Pacific Regional Meeting in Hyderabad, India where he participated in the educational portion of the meeting in addition to being a representative of the Europe/Africa-Middle East region at a strategic planning meeting held with IACLE's industry partners. In October 2007, Wim successfully completed the IACLE Accreditation Examination and was approved as a Fellow of IACLE (FIACLE).

In addition to his academic career, Wim is a member of the OVN – the Dutch Association of Optometrists and the British Contact Lens Association. He has also volunteered at the National Special Olympics in 2006 and 2008, by providing optometric services to the athletes.

FIACLE Profile – **RICARDO PINTOR** – Americas Region

Professor Ricardo Pintor graduated second in his class in 1996 from the Universidad Nacional Autónoma de México (UNAM). Ricardo then became a member of the teaching staff at UNAM, where he spent the next 10 years teaching optometry and contact lenses.

In addition to his specialized interest in contact lenses, Professor Pintor also has experience in clinical refraction, co-management of pre- and post-surgery patients and fitting of irregular corneas using topographic assessment. This experience has been gained through his work in an ophthalmological practice in Mexico.

Over the years, Ricardo has become a key opinion leader for industry and recently in addition to his teaching responsibilities, Ricardo works as a consultant to Johnson & Johnson Vision Care and lectures at the Vision Care Institute in Latin America.

Ricardo has had many cornea and contact lens articles published and has presented at more than 100 conferences in Mexico and Latin America. He has taught many courses and workshops in optometry and clinical ophthalmology, including the International Basic Contact Lens Course conducted by CLAO. In addition to his academic and corporate responsibilities, Ricardo is the Editor-in-Chief of the new Pan American Journal of Contact Lenses and the Secretary of the National College of Optometrists in Mexico.

Ricardo has been a member of IACLE since 1998 and joined the organization because of its good credibility and high standards.
